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**It is the student’s responsibility to check with a counselor each year for updated IGETC information.**

- Students with Advanced Placement (AP) and/or International Baccalaureate (IB) examinations should check with a counselor to verify application of the examinations to the appropriate IGETC areas.
- Courses listed in multiple areas will not be certified in more than one area except for courses in Language Other Than English.

### IGETC

The Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC) is a common general education pattern for California Community College students wishing to transfer to the University of California (UC) system, the California State University (CSU) system, or to some private universities.

- **Check with a counselor to see if IGETC is a good choice for you.**
- It is an OPTION, not a requirement. The universities have their own local general education or breadth pattern that a student may follow instead.
- IGETC is NOT required for admission, and does not necessarily fulfill all admission or graduation requirements.
- IGETC is a GOOD CHOICE for majors in the arts, humanities, and social sciences.
- IGETC is NOT a good choice for majors in the sciences, engineering computer science, or architecture, because of the large number of major prerequisites that need to be completed first.
- Do not use IGETC for UC Berkeley’s Haas School of Business or College of Environmental Design; UC San Diego’s Revelle or Roosevelt Colleges; or UC Riverside’s Computer Science or Engineering majors.
- UC San Diego requires IGETC completion for the Transfer Admission Guarantee (TAG) program. Note: the TAG program at UCSD is being phased out. The last available term for TAG admission will be Fall 2014; to apply, you must submit your TAG application in Fall 2013.

**To be considered for UC admission, you must fulfill both of the following requirements:**

1. Complete 60 semester units of UC transferable college credit with a grade point average of at least 2.4 (2.8 if you’re a nonresident). No more than 14 semester units may be taken Pass/No Pass.
2. Complete the following course pattern requirements, earning a grade of “C” or better in each UC transferable course (each course must be worth at least 3 semester or 4-5 quarter units):
  - a. TWO courses in English Composition; AND
  - b. ONE course in Mathematical Concepts and Quantitative Reasoning; AND
  - c. FOUR courses chosen from at least two of the following subject areas:
    - Arts and Humanities;
    - Social and Behavioral Sciences;
    - Physical and Biological Sciences.

**To qualify for CSU admission as an upper division transfer, you must:**

1. Complete 60 semester units of CSU transferable college credit with a grade point average of at least 2.0 (2.4 if you’re a nonresident) in all transferable college units attempted.
2. Complete at least 30 of those units from general education courses, including courses in each of the following areas with grades of “C” or better: 1A-English Composition; 1B-Critical Thinking; 1C-Oral Communication; 2-Mathematical Concepts and Quantitative Reasoning.
